Dr. Douglas Tallamy, Keynote Speaker Nationally Acclaimed Author

Douglas Tallamy is an entomologist and celebrated author. Tallamy's best-selling books, Bringing Nature and Nature's Best Hope, demonstrate the link between native plants and the insects that sustain birds and other wildlife and present a new paradigm for gardening and landscaping based on this link. With his concept of a Homegrown National Park, Tallamy shows how anyone with access to a piece of land can take action to create essential habitat for wildlife. Small efforts by many people in their yards or public spaces can build new ecological networks to connect plant and animal populations, giving them the resilience to survive and thrive and restoring the ecosystem services that sustain us all.



Mary Ellen Lemay, Speaker Northeast Pollinator Pathways

Mary Ellen Lemay holds a Masters in Environmental Management from Yale. As a former elected official, Land Trust Conservation president, current Commission Chair, and CT DEEP Certified Master Wildlife Conservationist, she has drafted legislation and implemented plans to protect critical open space and watershed lands, developed a "smart growth" pedestrian friendly plan and policy, MetroCOG and co-chairs the Conservation Technical Advisory Committee. Lemay is currently working on green infrastructure projects in the Pequannock River Watershed recently completed a dune restoration project in Maine. She is founder of Eco-Sites, LLC, an environmental consulting,

design, and outreach cooperative specializing in the use of natural systems for habitat restoration and stormwater management. Lemay is a member of the regional team of the Northeast Pollinator Pathways Project.



Tobias Fox, Founder of Newark Science & Sustainability



Founder of the NEEC

Jose German-Gomez, founder of the Northeast Earth Coalition, has been an environmental activist and urban farmer since he was a teen and has kept the passion for gardening all his life. He is the co-founder of the Montclair Backvard Habitat Project and founder of the Montclair Eco-Film Fest. Jose writes articles and blogs about environmental issues, sustainable communities, and affordable food. He is a master gardener, a Rutgers Environmental Steward, and a passionate advocate for native plants, wildlife habitats, pollinator gardens, and community gardens. He is a member of the Montclair Parks and Recreation Advisory Board and Liaison for the Montclair Environmental Commission.



Armando Cruz, Speaker NJ Climate Save

Armando Cruz, environmentalist, community activist, and animal and human rights advocate, is Senior Nutrition Educator at the Community Food Bank of

New Jersey (CFBNJ). He is also a founder of the New Jersey Climate Save, which has mobilized community residents to collect thousands of pounds of trash, preventing further damage to public parks, rivers, and oceans. Cruz has conducted recycling classes for youth groups, organized peaceful environmental and animal rights actions, and is working to create mini community food gardens in public spaces. By raising awareness of how to grow and access healthy, quality produce and minimize waste, he works to empower all individuals to create change.



Debra Kagan, Executive Director NJ Bike & Walk

Debra Kagan, Executive Director of New Jersey Bike and Walk Coalition, has worked as a consultant for non-profit organizations in the areas of development of advocacy campaigns, community engagement strategies, and campaign implementation. As Lenape Field Manager, Kagan worked with the revitalization initiative and relationships conservancies, local park governments, and communities. She was previously the President of Bike & Walk Montclair, a nonprofit community-based organization advocating for policies, programs, and street designs that support safe biking and walking and the creation of public places for a more equitable, healthy and livable community where the streets are for everyone. In her position with NJ Bike and Walk, Kagan is a key advocate for the Essex-Hudson Greenway, which will create a safe biking and walking link from Montclair to Jersey City.
